An Earth Day Reflection By Laura Marx

Sister T invited me to share my thoughts on caring for creation and Earth Day. I was honored and hope that my passion for our Earth is catchy! As a teacher, I try to spread a passion for caring about Earth, as a family member and friend, I tend to drag folks out on adventures of hiking, waterfalls, canoes, and the like, and as a Shepherd member, I have had the joy of experiencing nature with the youth as well as enjoying the passion of our church's Care for Creation events and actions.

I reflected on the ELCA's Social Statement on Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice as I pondered what to write about. What amazingness that we, as Lutherans, have Social Statements. And we, as Lutherans, have a social statement that reminds us that God made creation for us and assigned us as care-takers of it! I love this! So often caring for creation seems so hard. A quote from the ELCA social statement: "We are called to live according to God's wisdom in creation (Proverbs 8), which brings together God's truth and goodness. Wisdom, God's way of governing creation, is discerned in every culture and era in various ways. In our time, science and technology can help us to discover how to live according to God's creative wisdom." Hard, yes, but very empowering.

I think I tie Earth Day, creation, and God together in my mind because of several experiences I have had in the wilderness. I grew up camping and at the lake and surrounded by my Lutheran family who love nature. I worked at Wilderness Canoe Base in the BWCA as a young adult and got to bring a group of Shepherd youth there in 2016. Something about getting out in the wilderness



opens up our minds to really see God's creation as it was made and being away from the bustle of life allows us to reflect on ourselves in God's world. I found that somewhere between belting out "The Hills are Alive" with Nina Gourley, listening to Sam Magneson's long silly seagull stories, and watching these middle schoolers carry canoes heavier than Luke Welsh, there were amazing moments of closeness to God. I witnessed moments like this as a canoe guide long ago and still do today! When my kids were in middle school and high school, I attended several mission trips.

Sitting outside by the waterfalls and Lake Superior while in Duluth, something about that beauty and setting allowed kids to share and reflect on God in their lives. Lunchtime conversation, even with quieter or usually joke-telling kids, became reflective and raw. Nature just does that. The author Sigurd Olson reminds us: "In wilderness people can find the silence and the solitude . . . and through an experience of the eternal mystery, can give them a sense of the sacredness of all creation."

Happy Earth Day 2024! May we find time to look for a slice of nature this April and to remember that we are indeed the care-takers of creation!

April Worship

Sabbatical Preparations

Plans for Pastor Renee's sabbatical leave are taking solid shape as she figures out who will do what in her absence. One of the fun components of the "What Weaves Us Together" clergy and congregational renewal grant is the commissioning of a resident artist to create a piece that represents our story and how we are woven together. Renee has partnered with artist Lisa (Skildum) Lenglet to draft and create ideas for this project. It will involve wall hangings that incorporate some of our written stories, Bible verses and the liturgical colors of our worship. Renee will be speaking about this in the coming weeks. The pieces will be created over the summer while Renee is gone and blessed in a worship service upon her return.

Summer Choral Series

We've also had enough interest to generate a summer choral music series. The Summer Singers will come July 27th. Lumina, a women's quartet, will be here on Tuesday, July 30th. The week will conclude with the Vox Nova Chorale, which is led by former Director of Music and Worship- Vicki Peters. They will perform on Saturday, August 3rd. All three of these programs will be free and open to the public.

Fill the Truck

Pastoral staff are working on another Fill-the-Truck Joy Team event that is slated to happen at the end of April. This event was held last year and was very well received. We are once again seeking to hold this event at Cub in White Bear Lake in partnership with Ralph Reeder Food Shelf. The goal is to fill a U-Haul with items needed most by Ralph Reeder. People will be encouraged to head over after worship to help fill the truck!

VBS/Music Camp

Registration for summer 2024 VBS and music/worship camp, to be held 6/24-6/27, is live. Shaun is planning a Music Camp that focuses on the elements of worship rather than a program like last year surrounding Christmas in July. This model will help the kids understand what the different pieces of our liturgy look like and why we do them.

Spontaneous Seniors

Hopefully beginning in April, Pastor Brice will be organizing a Spontaneous Seniors Part Deux. This pop-up ministry from the early 2000s was organized by Jim and Mavis Merrell and Lloyd and Shirley Carrigan. Functioning much in the same way, this expression will be an opportunity to participate in real and intentional fellowship outside of the times of Lunch Bunch, and Sunday mornings. The plan would be to rent a bus and go to a different destination each gathering. Possibilities could include a tour or attending an art exhibit. Preliminary feedback is very positive.

In God's Creation: What Do You WONDER about?

I do not know who to give credit for this, but I love the saying, "The world does not lack for wonders, only for a sense of wonder." As I prepare for my sabbatical trip to Iceland, and all of the outdoor wonders that it beholds, I am reminded that beauty can be found in many unexpected places. Iceland is called the land of fire and ice, a place of volcanos and snowstorms at the same time. A place of raw nature and beauty and I am looking forward to the wonder of it, snow and all.

Oddly, I have found myself missing the snow that we are accustomed to here in Minnesota this winter season (not the driving...just the snow!) I rather welcomed the snowflakes that fell on a recent March Sunday morning as I drove into church. They shimmered as they fell, and it was a beautiful sight! It is all too easy to miss the wonder that is right in front of us. We have a tendency to squander the amazing wonders God offers us including snowflakes in the early morning sky. It seems that all too quickly we move on to other urgent things like National Penguin Day, Mother's Day, and the like.

Think of what we're missing if we bounce from one event to the next without even a passing glance at what surrounds us: the marvel, the wonder, the quiet shimmer of snowflakes in the early morning sky of our over-stimulated, over-medicated, under-appreciated, self-obsessed world.

My faith calls me to live differently. It calls me to slow down, to make space and time for the wonder of God and God's Creation that surrounds us in all this beauty. But it takes intentionality and focus to experience wonder and stand amazed. It takes time to notice the Love that is contained in a budding tree or in sprouting grass or a shimmering snowflake. It really takes time to savor Love, and God sends Love in all kinds of wonderful ways. It is a challenge for us to recognize this as 21st century earth dwellers.

We have places to be and things to accomplish. We're behind on several things and feeling guilty for not taking on more. We're anxious about much, confused about much, and frustrated about much in ourselves, our families, and our world. Days roll into weeks, roll into months, and we only celebrate when the calendar tells us to. But occasionally the snowflakes fall in the wee hours of the morning to reboot our wonder of all of this beauty. I believe it is our call to make space to celebrate God's Creation...often. For when we do, we experience that we have a God of renewal and (re)Creation. A God that makes things new all the time.

Celebrating and thanking God for this Creation is important for us. It reminds us of this gift that we have been given and of our mutual call to care for all of it. Join us on April 21 for a special worship service in celebration of God's Creation as we recognize Earth Day (Apr 22). Come enjoy a day when we will join our voices together in praise to God from whom all Creation and blessings flow!

My third intentionally planned thing was taking pottery classes at a local art institute. There I not only met some wonderful people but found deep connection with the ancient art of hand building pottery which is done in a similar fashion today as it was done in Biblical times and that fascinates me beyond words.

I was also able to have lots of time for plans less structured. From lunch dates with my grandma, reconnecting with friends and family, to beginning remodel projects on my entryway staircase, a road trip to Winnipeg with friends, and some spur of the moment trips to visit or travel with family, much of my time was filled with deep connections and great amounts of space to simply be. My favorite experience was when my sister had her baby in early March. I was able to be there without needing to work around scheduling, to meet my nephew Roran, and spend time with his big brother and their amazing parents celebrating this amazing new life.

I would love to share more, as well as hear updates on your life. Be sure to stop me when you see me and let's catch up! Again, so grateful for this amazing opportunity and so grateful to be back with you all!

Ecclesiastes 3:20²⁰ All go to one place; all are from the dust, and all turn to dust again.

In the heart of a forest, amidst the rustling leaves and towering trees, a group of men from our congregation embarked on a journey of service and discovery during our recent Men's Retreat, tucked into woods of the Brainerd Lakes Area Confidence Learning Center. As the chainsaws screamed and wood split, we found not only a sense of purpose but also a profound joy in embracing our role as caretakers of God's creation.

At Confidence Learning Center, a haven nestled in nature's embrace and designed for people with developmental and physical disabilities, we were reminded of the inherent worth and dignity of every individual. In the midst of this serene setting, our service project took on new meaning. As we chopped and cut wood, not

merely as a task to be completed, it became a labor of love and solidarity with our fellow human beings. We learned of a camp whose purpose was to provide an outdoor outlet for everyone regardless of ability. From the use of golf carts to all terrain wheelchairs, few places remain inaccessible to everyone who comes to their plot of land seeking refuge in nature.

We met Andrew, a staff person who oversaw the volunteers that first morning. He told us we'd be cutting and splitting wood that had been felled during a storm a couple years previous. He told us that straight line winds came through and knocked over more than 500 trees, some so big they were just now beginning to dry enough to be split.

With coffee in hand, because coffee is always a must when retreating, we made our way to the sprawling piles. We started the splitter, fired up the chainsaws, and away we went. Smiles always present and sweat beading even in the midst of the brisk morning, we filled three pallets of wood and developed deeper community.

In the laughter shared and the stories exchanged around the woodpile, we witnessed the transformative power of community. We found a shared and sacred space in our communal humanity and our desire to make a meaningful difference in the world. Together, we discovered that true joy is found not in isolation but in connection. Connection with one another and connection with the natural world that surrounds us.

Even in the simplicity of drying and decaying timber we are ever connected to the living and dying process. We remain inescapably reminded of this constant connection to creation and in doing so see our own part in all of that, stepping in and tending to what remains after a death in a system.

While our time at The Confidence Learning Center was limited to Saturday morning, it remains a consistent highlight of our time each and every year as we step in and help out where we're most needed. If you've ever thought about joining us, know we'd love to include you!

I'm not someone who fishes or hunts. I'm not someone who seeks out long nature hikes. I enjoy going to the lake but need indoor plumbing, electricity, wi-fi and air conditioning.

Despite my shortcomings, I find myself awed by God's creation. My mind immediately goes to nature when pondering God's creation, but God does far more than simply build the tapestry around which we live.

My faith is reinforced through creation in understanding that God continues to create to this day. We see evidence of God's creation wherever we go. New babies are born (and puppies)! Innovation continues to improve our world. We continue to evolve and grow as humans.

In my work, I encounter creation through new music and hymns. The hymn below, *In Sacred Manner*, was written 34 years ago by local poet Susan Palo Cherwien, who has since passed. Her words call us to stop and behold what may seem like the ordinary. I share these words as a call to action to sit up and take notice to what God continues to do. When we ponder the world around us, perhaps it causes us to be more mindful of how we treat God's creation.


